Dementia Friends is a global movement that is changing the way people think, act and talk about dementia. Developed by the Alzheimer's Association of the UK, the Dementia Friends initiative is well underway in Minnesota with over 26,000 people trained as Dementia Friends. Approximately 99,000 Minnesotans age 65+ are living with Alzheimer's disease. It is projected that Alzheimer's cases and other dementias will double by 2050. These numbers represent family members, friends, neighbors, co-workers, colleagues, congregants and customers. Dementia Friends training helps individuals heighten their awareness of dementia and equips them to respond warmly and effectively when interacting with people living with dementia and their care partners.

WHAT IS A DEMENTIA FRIEND?

Individuals become a Dementia Friend by attending a one-hour informational session to learn the five key messages about dementia, what it's like to live with the disease, and how to turn understanding into action that supports people living with dementia.
